AGUIDE TO PLANTING ADVANCED BALLED & BURLAPPED TREES



HOLE PREPARATION & TREE PLACEMENT


- 1. Dig planting hole no deeper than the root ball height. Where possible, dig the hole 2-3 times larger than the diameter of the root ball.
- 2. Ensure the sides of the planting hole are roughened and not glazed (shiny/glazed soil can be often caused by holes dug using an auger or similar).
- 3. Prior to placing the tree in the hole, ensure any string or broken branches in the crown are pruned and/or removed.
- 4. Gently lower the tree into the hole so that the trunk flare is at or slightly higher than the final landscape finish level.






PLANTING THE TREE

- 1. Backfill 1/3 of the planting hole with original soil (or imported soil as specified) to stabilise root ball and keep tree upright and straight
- 2. Until the burlap from around the trunk, peel back hessian and wire 2/3 of the way down the root ball. The burlap is 100% biodegradable and will rot. The wire basket will rust.
- 3. Completely backfill the hole with the soil. A slow release fertiliser and/or other ameliorants may be incorporated into this soil at this time.



MULCHING, STAKING & WATERING


- 1. Create a mulch ring around the tree and an 80-100mm high soil berm at the edge of the planting hole. Ensure mulch is away from the trunk.
- 2. Water the tree in thoroughly at planting time and continue as required to ensure that the core root ball of the tree is moist but not wet.



MULCHING, STAKING & WATERING (CONT.)

3. If stakes are necessary to support the tree to remain upright and reduce movement in the root ball, drive stakes at least 500-600mm deep into the soil at the edge of the planting hole.

4. Using a figure-8 type arrangement or similar to loop around the tree (with appropriate tree tying material) firmly tie or secure material at the stake. Stakes should be removed after approximately 12 months.
